Program Description	<p>1. The department's educational goal is to “cultivate talent in hospitality management with professional service competitiveness”, focusing on enhancing students' employability by developing workplace competitiveness, ethics, and attitudes, along with the essential professional knowledge needed for career growth. This prepares students for long-term career development in the hospitality industry.</p> <p>2. The Overseas Youth Vocational Training Program’s “Department of Hospitality Management” centers on two core curricula: “Hospitality Service and Management” and “Hotel Service and Management”. The program aims to cultivate overseas Chinese students into future culinary and management professionals in the hospitality sector, equipping them with innovative entrepreneurial thinking to create new opportunities in the job market. In culinary education, we continue to build foundational skills in culinary arts and front-of-house service; in hotel education, we emphasize advanced learning in hotel services and management, providing students with employability skills that keep pace with the times.</p>

Mandarin courses (online or on-campus courses)	<p>This program includes a one-year curriculum comprising Practical Chinese (I)(II), Everyday Chinese (I)(II), and language tutoring (I)(II), among other subjects, taught by specialized Chinese language instructors arranged by the school. All appointed Chinese language instructors meet the Ministry of Education's hiring standards, which require them to have graduate degrees or above from domestic or international universities and possess a Ministry of Education certificate in teaching Chinese as a second language. Alternatively, they may hold a graduate degree or above in Chinese literature, Taiwanese literature, or related fields of language education from a domestic or international university and have completed over 120 hours of Chinese language teacher training for teaching Chinese as a second language at a domestic or international university.</p>

<p>Internship</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Off-campus internships are conducted from the sophomore to senior years, two days per week, with an average of approximately 16 hours of internship per week. 2. Internship Allowances and Benefits <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ Internship Allowance: In accordance with the Labor Standards Act, allowances are calculated based on the statutory minimum wage. As of 2025, the minimum hourly wage is NT\$190. For monthly compensation, the minimum remuneration for performing labor in line with the statutory maximum of 40 working hours per week is NT\$28,590 per month. ■ Benefits: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1). The Caesar Hotel Group provides interns with benefits such as staff meals and dining discounts. (2). Humble House Hospitality Management Consulting Co., Ltd. provides interns with the following benefits: a full-attendance bonus of NT\$1,000 per month, housing allowance of NT\$2,000 per month, free meals, complimentary uniforms with laundry service, holiday bonuses, birthday celebrations, and participation in annual company events such as the Spring Banquet. (3). Family International Dining Co., Ltd. provides interns with the following benefits: competency allowances, staff meal discounts, employee meal vouchers, semester scholarships, and subsidies for chef certification. 3. Partner companies offering student internships must provide stipends no less than the minimum wage (calculated based on the number of internship days divided by the total working days in the month) or pay based on the minimum hourly wage. 4. Internship Institutions: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) Caesar Park Hotels & Resorts currently operates six international level hotels in the northern region, namely Caesar Park Hotel Taipei, Caesar Park Hotel Banqiao, Caesar Metro Hotel Taipei, Just Palace Hotel, arTree Hotel, Hotel Cham Cham Taipei. Work-study During Semester	After obtaining a work permit in Taiwan, part-time work during the academic semester is limited to a maximum of 20 hours per week. There are no restrictions on working hours during the winter and summer breaks.
Employment Counseling	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Explaining the quota scoring criteria for foreign students applying for work permits in Taiwan. 2. Organizing employment guidance seminars, inviting senior executives from the hospitality industry to discuss the employment environment in Taiwan with students. 3. Hosting on-campus career seminars and employment matching to provide an exchange platform, thereby enhancing students' employment opportunities in Taiwan. 4. Retention Assessments by Internship Institutions: Two months before the end of the internship, supervisors from students' internship institutions will conduct retention assessments based on students' work attitudes (professional dedication), professional knowledge and skills, teamwork, willingness to learn, adaptability, stability, resilience to pressure, and other relevant factors. Those who pass the assessment will be invited to continue their employment with their institutions. 5. The OCAC's "Global Talent Platform for Overseas Taiwanese Businesses" (https://Talents.Taiwan-World.net) assists with employment matching. 6. The OCAC's Overseas Credit Guarantee Fund (Taiwan) provides startup fund loans.

Scholarships and Financial Aids	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The OCAC provides the following grants and subsidies: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The first two years of tuition grant: each new student will be granted TWD 20,000 per semester during the first two academic years. (The tuition grant for national universities has been applied to actual charges, with a maximum limit of TWD 20,000) ● Excellent Conduct and Academic Performance Scholarship: Available for those with excellent academic performance. Those who have obtained certificates and competition awards will be awarded TWD 6,000 per person per academic year. ● Medical Insurance for Overseas Compatriot Students (6 months): A total of TWD 600 will be subsidized (before students enroll in National Health Insurance). ● Healthcare: Every student is required to enroll in National Health Insurance and pay the insurance premiums. Students who have proof of economic hardship (or financial difficulty document) are subsidized 50 % of the insurance premiums. (Current monthly subsidy is TWD 413). ● Work-study subsidy and economic hardship scholarship: TWD 2,500 per month for students who are offered work-study opportunities. ● Emergency Aid: Provided on a case-by-case basis. 2. Scholarship and subsidies provided by the University: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ Tuition and Miscellaneous Fees Exemption: (after deducting direct government

subsidies for students)

- A 50% reduction in tuition and miscellaneous fees is provided for freshmen during the first and second semesters.
- Tuition and miscellaneous fees are reduced by 25% for the third and fourth semesters.

 - Teaching materials:TWD 2000 per semester (based on actual charges)
 - Computer usage:TWD 850 per semester
