Program Description	<p>1. The educational objectives of this department are: (1) to cultivate a dedicated service attitude and workplace ethics; (2) to acquire professional knowledge and skills in tourism and leisure sports; and (3) to broaden diverse perspectives and foster lifelong learning. Based on industry needs, professional development, faculty expertise, and curriculum planning, we uphold the principles of "practical skills" and "reducing the learning-application gap" to cultivate practical and effective tourism, leisure sports service, and management talents. Our distinctive development is based on the principle of "adaptively igniting talents and meeting the needs of the leisure and leisure industry."</p> <p>2. This program is planned to focus on "tourism" and "leisure sports" as two major development axes. These two development axes are explained as follows: (1) Leisure Sports: The department applies knowledge development in the field of leisure sports. This combines practical experience in leisure sports with theoretical knowledge in sports science with the department's foundational knowledge in "service" and "management." We plan and implement customized events for related organizations. We can also provide scientific and professional diagnosis and advice based on individual exercise conditions and fitness levels. (2) Tourism: Faculty and students in the department integrate diverse knowledge systems through participation, discussion, collaboration, and sharing, aiming to cultivate practical and applicable talents. This is achieved through experiential and multifaceted learning and action learning. This includes student participation in on-campus internships, industry-university collaborations (campus guided tours and interpretation activities, campus ecological guided tours), overseas visits, and the creation of tour competition entries to achieve knowledge integration and unleash creativity.</p>

Mandarin courses (online or on-campus courses)	<p>This one-year program offers courses such as Practical Chinese (I) and (II), Daily Chinese (I) and (II), and Language Guidance (I) and (II). These courses are taught by dedicated Chinese language teachers assigned by the school. Chinese language teachers are hired in accordance with the Ministry of Education's recruitment standards and must hold a master's degree or higher from a domestic or international college and possess a Ministry of Education Certificate in Teaching Chinese as a Foreign Language, or a master's degree or higher from a domestic or international university in Chinese language and literature, Taiwanese literature, or language teaching, and have completed at least 120 hours of training at a domestic or international university for teaching Chinese as a foreign language.</p>

Students must participate in off-campus internships within the country to meet course requirements. The internship duration is 40 hours per week. 2. Internship Allowances and Benefits <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ Internship Allowance: The internship partner will provide an internship allowance of no less than the base salary (calculated based on the number of internship days divided by the number of workdays in that month) or a base hourly wage. ■ Benefits: Staff meals, holiday bonuses, birthday prizes, company dinners, etc. 3. Caesar International Management Consultants Caesar International Management Consultants Co., Ltd. was established in 2013 by the Hung Kuo Group, focusing on hotel operation, management, planning, and development. Its core business covers the construction and resource integration of various types of hotels. Since taking over the Taipei Hilton Hotel in 1988, the Hung Kuo Group has expanded into the hospitality industry and has developed the Caesar Hotels chain, comprising 10 hotels with more than 3,000 guest rooms. Employment Counseling	<p>The implementation of the career guidance mechanism and supporting measures for students in the department are divided into four phases:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Exploration Period: The university provides UCAN career interest assessments, career counseling, and related activities to help students better understand their personality traits, personal orientations, learning conditions, and career directions. In addition, the Counseling Center offers a variety of psychological assessments to support students in self-understanding and career planning. 2. Through professional courses and certification counseling, the department strengthens students' core competencies and actively encourages them to take professional certification exams. Since the 2005 academic year, the university has implemented the "Regulations for Skill Certification and Professional License Scholarships," offering scholarships based on certification levels to enhance

Intensive period: (1) Practical Thematic Lectures: Industry executives, successful professionals, and distinguished alumni are invited to share insights on career planning, industry trends, employment markets, and job-seeking skills, as well as provide training in résumé and autobiography writing.(2) Corporate Field Visits: Faculty members lead students to visit enterprises, enabling them to understand real-world operations and management concepts, broaden their horizons, and gain deeper awareness of workplace dynamics.</p> <p>4. Confirmation period: (1) On-Campus Recruitment: Enterprises are invited to the university to conduct recruitment activities, including company presentations, interviews, and on-the-spot hiring, to improve job-matching effectiveness.(2) Graduate Employment Survey: Employment status is regularly tracked before graduation and one year after graduation, with feedback collected from alumni and employers.(3) Ministry of Labor Employment Program: With government subsidies, courses are offered on résumé writing, interview skills, industry analysis, and career planning.(4) Internship-to-Employment Program: In collaboration with Lion Travel and other enterprises, students selected through a rigorous process participate in internships, with the opportunity to transition to full-time employment upon graduation.</p>

Tuition: NT\$20,000 per semester for the first and second academic years (tuition subsidies for public schools have already been collected, with a maximum limit of NT\$20,000).</p> <p>(2). Academic Excellence Scholarship: Awarded to students who meet academic standards during their first academic year after enrollment, each student receives NT\$6,000 per academic year.</p> <p>(3). Overseas Chinese Health Insurance: NT\$600 for six months (after arrival in Taiwan, but before enrolling in National Health Insurance).</p> <p>(4). National Health Insurance: Subsidizes half of the National Health Insurance deductible for students from financially disadvantaged backgrounds (NT\$413 per month).</p> <p>(5). Work-Study and Learning Assistance: The school arranges work-study or learning activities, with a monthly subsidy of NT\$2,500 per student depending on participation.</p> <p>(6). Emergency Relief and Aid: Assistance is provided on a case-by-case basis.</p> <p>2. School Provisions:</p> <p>Tuition and Miscellaneous Fee Waivers: (After deducting direct government subsidies)</p> <p>(1). Tuition and Miscellaneous Fees are waived for new students in their first and</p>

second semesters (i.e., first year).
 (2). A quarter of the tuition and miscellaneous fees will be waived for the third and fourth semesters (i.e. the second academic year).
